






Who we are

Los Angeles Inspiring Connections
Outdoors (LA ICO) is one of 55 Sierra
Club Inspiring Connections Outdoors
Committees nationwide: LA ICO was
started by a small group of Sierra Club
volunteers in 1983. Today, our 40 trip
leaders lead outings for over 4,000
youngsters and 500 parents and
teachers annually. Our leaders are
trained in outdoor and safety skills as
well as environmental education.

What we do

LA ICO enables urban youth, the disabled, and others to appreciate, enjoy, and respect the environment while achieving goals they might never undertake in their urban setting. Our core outings are four-to five-mile day hikes, often in the Santa Monica Mountains. Typically, 25 to 30 youngsters take part in each hike and are accompanied by representatives from the school or agency. Other family members are welcome to join and participate as well. In addition to the day hikes, LA ICO sponsors overnight camping trips, snow trips, visits to coastal lagoons and tide pools, and service projects.





The young people we serve have little or no access to parks and open space. They live in Los Angeles County's poorest neighborhoods where over crowded housing and gang violence are common. Approximately 90% of the young people LA ICO serves live below the poverty line. The outings we offer are completely free of charge.
